

JEWELRY

Hello and happy summer Denver!

Although this is the only show we are doing over the summer, we have been buying jewelry for the last month and will continue to buy right up until we leave for the September show series. This means you get the pick of some great new jewelry from our very full inventory. So far, there is a great selection of earrings, rings and bracelets, as well as new turquoise bead necklaces along with a very nice collection of Santo Domingo necklaces.

First up, we have two beautiful turquoise necklaces made by the multi award winning Santo Domingo artist *Ray Lovato*. What makes Ray's necklaces so special? Ray uses only natural turquoise to create his pieces, and every bead is hand cut and drilled by Ray himself. His pieces are truly a labor of love!

We picked up some more great pieces from a large collection which we have been working on. There are about ten Santo Domingo necklaces, a large squash blossom necklace by Larry Begay, and a great old coin necklace with an Isleta cross at the bottom. The Isleta cross, also called dragonfly & Isleta cross, is associated with the Isleta pueblo. The symbol is believed to have originated with Moors & Spaniards. Because it resembled their dragonfly symbol, the indigenous peoples easily adopted the symbol into their culture when the Spanish first arrived in the southwest. The symbol at the bottom is a "partial heart", also known in Catholic culture as "bleeding heart" which alludes to Christ's heart ("Sacred Heart"). It is suggested that the Puebloans, however used the symbol because they felt it represented the generous heart of the dragonfly who loved the people. For more information, there's a book available through Amazon called "Heart of the Dragonfly" documenting the history of cross necklaces of the Pueblo & Navajo peoples.

Alton Bedonie made more ammolite masterpieces - necklaces as well as two sterling silver pendants that are sure to brighten any outfit! Alton also created six new turquoise rings, a really nice large Larimer pendant and a stunning double Lapis stone pendant.

On our most recent buying trip, Eric picked up about 12 beautiful Kingman turquoise necklaces, most of which are 17 to 18 inches in length. The turquoise has been stabilized to make the stone more durable but the color has not been changed. They are really nice and are very affordably priced. We have a good variety of other turquoise necklaces both short and long, as well as two small (and hard to get) Lone Mountain turquoise necklaces.

We are constantly buying earrings so our selection is always changing. This time out, in addition to newly made earrings by Navajo, Zuni and Santo Domingo artists, we have quite a few older earrings from the large collection we obtained. As you look around the room, be sure to check all the cases because we try to match up earrings with necklaces or other pieces that look good together. This means you may find that perfect pair of earrings for which you've been searching in a case other than the earring cases.

That's just the tip of the iceberg. Be sure to come see us to check out the thousands of items we have, from rings to necklaces and everything in between!



CARVINGS, POTTERY, RUGS AND MORE

We have a great selection of medium and small sandpaintings and several larger sandpaintings as well as some nice pieces of western art originals. All of our sand paintings are completely handmade, matted, and framed by Navajo artists. We also have sand painting boxes, which make lovely and unique gifts, and a few sand painting clocks.

Our kachina selection is strong with an inventory of Hopi carvings. Work from award winning

artists, Laurence Dallas, Keith Torres, Raymond Chee, Marlin Pinto and Sterling McRae are on hand. We have a great pair Martha Appleleaf and Carmelita Dunlap, black on black feather pattern pots as well as several much sought-after pots from Bob Lansing. Recently we acquired three Maria Martinez pots from a collection as well as pieces by Phyllis and Marlene Hemlock. This collection also contains several great miniature pots and a miniature storyteller.

We have a large selection of Zuni animal fetishes on hand. Many of these carvings are by well known, award winning artists and are crafted from an assortment of stones and organic material. *Marvin Toya*, from the Jemez Pueblo carved several mid-size pieces that measure in the six to eight inch range and some smaller inexpensive gift sized ones, including eagles, owls, corn maidens and others. Other not to miss pieces are some stunning carvings by *Florentine Martinez*, a multi-award winning Zuni carver. There will be something in everyone's price range, so be sure to stop by and see us!
